# Page 116 Droitwich Barge Canal and Droitwich Junction Canal

In 1973 the Droitwich Canals Trust Ltd was established and, with active support from local councils, restoration started. A feasibility study was carried out in 1994 which showed that restoration was possible from an engineering perspective and it would offer economic benefits to the area. The restoration was completed in 2011, with the official reopening ceremony taking place on 1 July.

The section of canal through the town was slightly rerouted with part of the River Salwarpe being canalised between the Barge Lock, at the end of Vines Park, and Lock 7 of the Junction Canal. Vines Park makes a charming centrepiece to the canals with lots of information and exhibits about salt production, including a brine well and an old Wych barge. Netherwich Basin, where salt used to be loaded into barges, has now been fitted out as a location to moor a boat, either permanently or for visitors. The Barge Canal was planned by Brindley and still winds in a gentle, sleepy fashion. New reedbeds were created next to the canal to compensate for the reeds that were cleared from the main waterway. At the River Severn end three new locks have been built and the most expensive part of the restoration was the construction of a navigable tunnel under the A449.

On the Junction Canal an existing culvert under the M5 has been made navigable but this has restricted headroom, 6ft 5in (a short 2m), and it is very narrow. Although it's quite short you need to ensure nothing is coming the other way before entering. Locks 4–7 are all newly built, with Lock 4 and Lock 5 as a staircase, and the three locks at Hanbury have been restored.

The reopening of the Droitwich canals offers boaters the chance to explore a new circuit, about 22 miles long, called the Mid-Worcester Ring. Starting in Droitwich you head west along the Barge Canal to Hawford, join the River Severn as far as Worcester and return via the Worcester and Birmingham Canal to Hanbury Junction and back to Droitwich on the Junction Canal. The Droitwich canals are a delightful diversion off the Worcester and Birmingham Canal, not to be missed by anyone cruising this area.

**Bridges** Several, including swing bridges. The first bridge up the canal from Hawford is exactly as built by Brindley and has not been touched since construction.

**Towpath** There is a towpath all along the canal. This has been upgraded for multi-purpose use.



## **Droitwich Junction Canal**

Bridges Six.

**Towpath** The towpath runs the length of the canal with a slight diversion along the Salt Way road to cross the M5.

**Tunnel** Under the M5. This is a short tunnel using an existing motorway culvert. Headroom is restricted to 6ft 5in and it is very narrow.

**Summit level** 147ft, Hanbury junction with the Worcester and Birmingham Canal.
